1. Call to Order, Roll Call

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Director Morgan moved to approve the consent agenda as presented, seconded by Director Lieberknecht, passed 4/0/3, Director Francisco abstained and an ID#1 representative was absent.

5. Reports From the Manager

The monthly water reports were included in the board packet.

b. Operations Report

The Operations Report was included in the board packet.

c. Meeting with Deputy Regional Director at ACWA Fall Conference, Indian Wells, November 30 – December 3, 2010 Regarding COMB Capital Improvement Needs

Ms. Rees reported on her meeting with Reclamation's Deputy Regional Director at the ACWA Fall Conference. She discussed with him the need to find funding for the many capital improvement projects for the Cachuma Project. Ms. Rees reported that legislation is probably the best possible means of funding for the Cachuma Project improvements. Reclamation cannot provide non-reimbursable funds under the current Cachuma Master Contract, which designates almost all costs as reimbursable.

d. Propositions 50 and 84 Process Update

Ms. Rees included updated information in the board packet.

e. Quagga Mussel Inspection Reports – County of Santa Barbara The Quagga Mussel Inspection monthly report from the County of Santa

The Quagga Mussel Inspection monthly report from the County of Santa Barbara was included in the board packet.

f. Extension of County Parks Recreation Agreement for Cachuma Park

A letter from Reclamation regarding the extension of the County Parks Recreation Agreement for the Cachuma Park was included in the board packet.

g. Cachuma Reservoir Current Conditions

The Cachuma Reservoir Conditions up to 12/15/2010 were included in the board packet.

6. 2nd Pipeline Project

a. Project Status Report

The project status report was included in the board packet.

b. Permit and NEPA Status Report

The permit status report was included in the board packet. The Notice of Availability was posted 12/10/2010 for 30 days; the Record of Decision can be signed by the Regional Director at Reclamation after the Environmental Review, completing the NEPA process by 1/31/2011. Reclamation's Finding of No Adverse Effect to Historic Properties for Section 106 was submitted to SHPO for a 30 day review period 12/6/2010 and should be completed by

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1/10/2010. The Section 106 process could be completed by 1/31/2010 and construction contract awarded by 2/25/2011.

c. Revised Funding Process and Project Approval Schedule A schedule was included in the board packet. The last round of approval would be for COMB to approve the Project Expenditure followed by ratification of each of the five Member Units.

d. Consider Letter to CVWD Requesting Reconsideration of Cost Sharing in 2nd Pipeline Project

Included in the board packet was a letter to the Carpinteria Valley Water District requesting that the District reconsider its earlier decision not to fund its share of the 2nd Pipeline Project.

Director Francisco moved to approve sending the letter to CVWD under the signature of President Hanson, seconded by Director Hanson, passed 6/0/1, ID #1 representative was absent.

7. Consider COMB Letter to California Highway Patrol in Support of Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors Request to Ban Trucks Carrying Hazardous Materials on Highway 154

At the request of President Hanson, staff prepared a letter of support to ban the hauling of hazardous waste materials on portions of Highway 154 in Santa Barbara County. Director Morgan suggested that the letter should emphasize the closeness of Hwy 154 adjacent to the water supply in Lake Cachuma.

Director Morgan moved to approve the letter to the California Highway Patrol including the suggested changes emphasizing the closeness of the highway to the Lake, seconded by Director Francisco, passed 6/0/1, ID#1 representative was absent.

8. Consider Approval of COMB Land Use Authorization Policy

Ms. Rees reported that staff had prepared draft land use authorization policies, procedures, applications, and special provisions for COMB. Staff recommended approval of this policy in order to proceed with land use requests within the SCC easement. The final land use documents for COMB's permitting activities have incorporated comments from the member units and COMB's General Counsel.

After discussion the Directors determined that staff should make quarterly reports to the Board on the progress of this procedure, and revisit the policy in a year to evaluate possible modifications. President Hanson provided suggestions and corrections to the policy. President Hanson also suggested that the COMB Land Use Authorization Policy be posted on COMB's website and linked to the Santa Barbara County Planning and Development Department and the City of Santa Barbara Planning Department websites. Staff will incorporate these suggestions into the document.

Director Morgan moved to approve COMB Land Use Authorization Policy and Procedures, Permit Application, Permit, and Fee Schedule with the stipulation for staff to make quarterly reports and in a year return it to the Board for possible modifications, and to incorporate the suggestions and corrections as stated by President Hanson, and to authorize the General Manager to implement the COMB Land Use Authorization Policy, seconded by Director Lieberknecht, passed 6/0/1, ID#1 representative was absent.

9. Consider Approval of Professional Agreements with: Cardno-Entrix, Northwest Hydraulics, HDR and Melinda Fournier

Ms. Rees reported that with the transfer of the existing Santa Ynez River Fisheries Program to COMB as of January 1, 2011, the consultants under contract with CCRB need to contract with COMB also effective January 1, 2011. Staff requested approval of the PSAs and authorization for the General Manager to sign them. Four consultant agreements were included in the board packet.

Director Morgan requested that the Scopes of Work and the hourly rates for the consultants be provided prior to approving the Professional Agreements. It was also requested that approval of the PSAs be deferred until a new ID#1 COMB representative was selected.

Director Francisco moved to approve the Professional Services Agreements for the consultants to carry out ongoing work for the existing Santa Ynez River Fisheries Program and related activities effective January 1, 2011, and to authorize the General Manager to sign the Professional Services Agreements for the consultants, seconded by President Hanson, motion failed 4/2/1, Director Morgan voted no, Director Lieberknecht voted no and ID#1 representative was absent.

The requested information will be reviewed by the COMB Operating Committee before coming back to the Board for approval at a special Board meeting on January 13, 2011.

10. Notification of Kate Rees' Retirement as COMB's General Manager and Appointment of Ad Hoc General Manager Search/Transition Committee

Included in the board packet was a notification of Kate Rees' retirement from COMB. Ms. Rees reported that it would be effective upon hiring a new General Manager but not later than June 30, 2011. Ms Rees will remain CCRB's Manager.

President Hanson appointed the representative from the City of Santa Barbara (Director Francisco) and the representative from Goleta Water District (President Hanson) to serve on an Ad Hoc Committee to search for a new General Manager and direct the transition. President Hanson announced that they would be meeting in early January.

RE: Department of Fish and Game Grant Agreements for Fish Passage

Improvements on Quiota Creek, Refugio Road

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution 516 and Resolution 517 to enter into two grant agreements with the California Department of Fish and Game for construction of the fish passage enhancement projects at Crossing 2 and Crossing 7 of Refugio Road over Quiota Creek.

DISCUSSION:

We have been awarded two grants from the California Department of Fish and Game (CDFG) in the amounts of \$735,501 to fully fund the Quiota Creek Crossing 2 Project, and \$442,736 for the initial half of the funding needed for the Quiota Creek Crossing 7 Project. The attached grant agreements require that the COMB Board approve resolutions agreeing to the terms and conditions of the contract.

We are finalizing the regulatory permits on both projects and are awaiting final approval of the engineering drawings from the National Marine Fisheries Service and CDFG which are expected by April, 2011. The second half of the funding needed for the Crossing 7 project (\$383,387) was applied for through the NOAA Open Rivers Initiative (ORI); grant recipients will be notified in June, 2011. Request for bids for both projects will be sent to selected contractors in early to mid-July, 2011. Construction of both projects is currently scheduled to begin in the fall of 2011. If we are not successful with ORI grant, the Quiota Creek Crossing 7 Project will be put on hold until further funding can be secured. CDFG is fully aware of this limitation for the Quiota Creek Crossing 7 Project.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CACHUMA OPERATION AND MANTENANCE BOARD APPROVING AN AGREEMENT WITH CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME FOR THE FISH PASSAGE IMPROVEMENT QUIOTA CREEK CROSSING NUMBER TWO

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Cachuma Operation and Maintenance Board (COMB) is a California Joint Powers Authority organized under the provisions of California Government Code Section 6500 et seq., with power to acquire, contract for improvements, own, develop, and operate facilities for projects undertaken by its Member Units; and

WHEREAS, in August, 1997, the National Marine Fisheries Service ("NMFS") listed anadromous steelhead in the Southern California Evolutionarily Significant Unit, including the Santa Ynez River downstream of Bradbury Dam, as an endangered species under the Federal Endangered Species Act and, completed and issued on September 11, 2000, a Biological Opinion relative to Cachuma Project operations as they relate to steelhead; and

WHEREAS, COMB is committed to implement and cooperate in project operations and other management actions designed to protect and enhance habitat conditions for steelhead in the Santa Ynez River and its tributaries downstream of Bradbury Dam; and

WHEREAS, the fish passage improvements at Crossing Number Two on Quiota Creek, a tributary to the Lower Santa Ynez River, will provide improved access to the perennial reaches of Ouiota Creek and restore habitat to enhance conditions for steelhead; and

WHEREAS, the California Department of Fish and Game authorized disbursement of up to \$735,501 to COMB for removal of a passage impediment/barrier for endangered steelhead at Crossing Number Two on Quiota Creek; and

WHEREAS, COMB has prepared a detailed Scope of Work with the specific tasks to be performed, a schedule of completion, and a detailed budget that will be used in a competitive bidding process for selection of a construction contractor, and construction management of the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. The Board of Directors of COMB supports the Fish Passage Improvements on Quiota Creek Crossing Number Two and these are considered essential to the

- 9. Prevailing wages may be required to be paid on certain types of projects, typically Public Works projects. Existing law defines "public works," as, among other things, construction, alteration, demolition, installation, or repair work done under contract and paid for in whole or in part out of public funds.

California Fish and Game Code section 1501.5 exempts from the prevailing wage requirements, contracts with public agencies, nonprofit organizations, or Indian tribes that exceed \$50,000 in cost, excluding the cost of gravel. The Grantor does not have responsibility for loss or damage to rented equipment arising from causes beyond the control of the Grantor. The Grantor's responsibility for repairs and liability for damage or loss is restricted to that made necessary by or resulting from the negligent act or omission of the Grantor or its officers, employees, or agents.

For the purpose of this Grant, "equipment" shall be defined as tangible property (including furniture) with a unit cost of \$5,000.00 or more and a useful life of one (1) year or more. Actual cost includes the purchase price plus all costs to acquire, install and prepare the equipment for its intended use. Any electronic equipment (such as computers, cameras, GPS units, etc.) regardless of cost, purchased with grant funds are the property of the State and must be returned to the State.

14. The Grant Manager may require the Grantee to submit progress reports as often as deemed necessary, but not more often than once a month. If the project is not completed in the current year, the Grantee will submit a summary of the completed portion no later than November 30 and again each year until completed.

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- 15. Grant disbursements will be made to the Grantee in arrears, upon receipt by the Grant Manager of an original itemized invoice. Invoices may not be submitted more frequently than monthly, in arrears, with the exception of the invoice for final retention (see #19). The invoice shall contain the following information:
 - a. The word "Invoice" should appear in a prominent location at the top of the page(s);
 - b. Printed name of the Grantee;
 - c. Business address of the Grantee including P.O. Box, City, State, and Zip Code;
 - d. Name of the Region/Division of the Department of Fish and Game being billed;
 - e. The date of the invoice and the time period covered; i.e., the term "from" and "to";
 - f. The number of the Grant upon which the claim is based;
 - g. The invoice must be itemized using the categories and following the format of the budget in Exhibit B. The amounts billed on the invoice must be tied to a specific element in the Statement of Work and the deliverable must be measurable.
 - h. The total amount due. This should be in a prominent location in the lower right-hand portion of the last page and clearly distinguished from other figures or computations appearing on the invoice. The total amount due shall include all costs incurred by the Grantee under the terms of this grant;
 - i. The original signature of the Grantee (not required of established firms or entities using preprinted letterhead invoices);
 - j. The Grantee must provide supporting documentation for the invoice and actual receipts upon request of the Grant Manager.
- 16. The Grantee agrees that all data, plans, drawings, specifications, reports, computer programs, operating manuals, notes and other written or graphic work produced in the performance of this Agreement, are subject to the rights of the State as set forth in this section. The State shall have the right to reproduce, publish, and use all such work, or any part thereof, in any manner and for any purposes whatsoever and to authorize others to do so.
- 17. Grantee agrees that all travel and per diem paid its employees under this Grant shall be at rates not to exceed those amounts paid to the State's represented employees under collective bargaining agreements currently in effect.
- 18. Each invoice for payment must be accompanied by a written description, not to exceed two pages in length, of the Grantee's performance under this grant since the time the previous such report was prepared. The report shall describe the types of activities and specific accomplishments during the period for which the payment is being made rather than merely listing the number of hours worked during the reporting period. The final invoice must include a budget summary of cost share expenditures by fund source.
- 19. Grantor shall withhold ten percent (10%) from each and every payment pending fulfillment of the Grantee's obligations herein. Upon completion of the Grantee's obligations, the Grantee must invoice for the payment retention.
- 20. Any disputes concerning the project or the Grant shall be resolved by the Project Managers of the Grantor and Grantee. In the event the dispute cannot be resolved by the Project Managers, the dispute shall be referred to the Director of the Department of Fish and Game, whose decision will be final.
- 21. The Grantee shall maintain complete and accurate records of its actual project costs and shall retain said records throughout the term of the Grant and for a period of three (3) years after receipt of final payment. During such time, said records shall be made available to the State of California, or their designated representative, for audit purposes during normal business hours. Expenditures not documented, and expenditures not allowed under the Grant or otherwise authorized by the

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Grantor shall be borne by the Grantee. The audit shall be confined to those matters connected with the Grant, including but not limited to, the administration and overhead costs.

- 22. All subcontracts will be made in a manner to provide, to the maximum extent practicable, open and free competition. In order to ensure objective subcontract performance and eliminate unfair competitive advantage, subcontractors that develop or draft work requirements, statements of work, or requests for proposals shall be excluded from competing for such subcontracts.
- 23. If a subcontractor is used, then a written copy of the sub agreement must be submitted to the Grant Manager, prior to the commencement of work by the subcontractor. The subcontract must include specific language which establishes the rights of the auditors of the State to examine the records of the subcontractor relative to the services and materials provided under the grant.
- 24. The Grantee and any subcontractors shall permit the Grantor to review and inspect project activities at all reasonable times during the performance period of this Grant, including review and inspection on a daily basis.
- 25. The project specifications subject to this Grant may only be amended in writing by mutual agreement of the Grantor and Grantee. If any change in the terms and conditions become necessary, a written request shall be made to the Grant Manager no later than six months prior to term end.
- 26. The Grantor may terminate the Grant upon giving thirty (30) days written notice to the Grantee. In case of early termination, a final payment will be made to the Grantee upon receipt of an invoice covering costs incurred up to notice of termination, based on the portion of work completed.
- 27. A Grantee's name and address may be provided to the public if requested. Other personal information submitted on this grant may be released to governmental entities involved with the funding of the project, for law enforcement purposes, pursuant to court order, or for official natural resources management purposes.
 - A Grantee may obtain a copy of his/her Grant file maintained by the Grantor by submitting a written request to the Department of Fish and Game, Fisheries Branch, Fisheries Restoration Grant Program, 830 "S" Street, Sacramento, CA 95811. All requests must include the requestor's name, address, and telephone number.
- 28. The Grantee shall comply with all applicable state laws, rules, regulations, and local ordinances specifically including but not limited to environmental, procurement and safety laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances. As may be necessary, the Grantee shall be responsible for obtaining the services of appropriately licensed professionals to comply with the applicable requirements of the Business and Professions Code including but not limited to section 6700 et seq. (Professional Engineers Act) and/or section 7800 et seq. (Geologists and Geophysicists Act).

If the Grantee fails to perform in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, the Grantor retains the right, at its sole discretion, to delay, interrupt, or suspend the work for which the grant monies are supplied.

EXHIBIT A FISH PASSAGE IMPROVEMENT ON CROSSING 2, QUIOTA CREEK STATEMENT OF WORK

Under direction of the Grantor, and under the following conditions and terms, the Grantee will:

- 1. Cachuma Operation and Maintenance Board, and its contractors, will provide access to 3.46 miles of perennial spawning and rearing habitat for southern steelhead by removing the keystone barrier at Crossing 2 within the Quiota Creek watershed, a tributary to the Santa Ynez River in Santa Barbara County. The proposed project is the removal of a non-functional culvert and road surface and replacement with a 60-foot bottomless-arched culvert with two riffles and two weirs. The channel will be graded to restore a naturalized stream channel that would allow full juvenile and adult passage for anadromous and resident fish while improving road access and safety. The resulting structure is designed to convey the 50-year flood with one foot of freeboard, while providing natural stream function and unlimited fish passage for the determined fish passage flows of 1 to 148 cfs. The structure is also designed to withstand the 100-year flood event. A secondary benefit of the project is to improve access and safety along Refugio Road for landowners, the public, and fire personnel accessing the upper basin of Quiota Creek and the Santa Ynez Mountain Range.
- Conduct work on Quiota Creek crossing number 2 approximately 2.48 miles upstream from the confluence of the Santa Ynez River. The project is located in Township 6N, Range 30W of the Santa Ynez 7.5 Minute U.S.G.S. Quadrangle, Latitude and Longitude 34.57393 N, 120.09447 W as depicted in Attachment 1, Project Location Map, which is attached and made part of this agreement by this reference.
- If the project will not be completed by March 31, 2013, and therefore the Grantee will be requesting an amendment for time, this request and a justification for the delay resulting in the time request must be submitted no later than December 1, 2012. The written request shall be sent to the Grant Manager.
- The Grantee shall not proceed with on-the-ground implementation until all necessary permits and consultations are secured, and they have received a notice to proceed from the Grantor's Grant Manager.
- 5. In instances where water is present in the work area, the Grantee shall notify the Grantor's Grant Manager a minimum of **five working days** before the project site is dewatered and the stream flow diverted. The notification shall provide a reasonable time for Department of Fish and Game (Department) personnel to supervise the implementation of the water diversion plan and oversee the safe removal and relocation of salmonids and other fish life from the project area. If the project requires dewatering of the site, and the relocation of salmonids, the Grantee shall implement the following measures to minimize harm and mortality to listed salmonids:
 - Fish relocation and dewatering activities shall only occur between June 15 and October 31 of each year.
 - The Grantee shall minimize the amount of wetted stream channel dewatered at each individual project site to the fullest extent possible.
 - The Grantee shall provide fish relocation data to the Grantor's Grant Manager on a form provided by the Department of Fish and Game.
 - Additional measures to minimize injury and mortality of salmonids during fish relocation and dewatering activities shall be implemented as described in Part IX, pages 52 and 53 of the California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual.
- 6. Work in flowing streams is restricted to June 15 through October 31 unless otherwise specified in the Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement issued by the Department and with the concurrence of the federal permitting agencies.

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- 7. The project shall follow the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS 2001) Guidelines for Salmonid Passage at Stream Crossings and DFG criteria for fish passage as described in the Third Edition, Volume II, Part IX, February 2003 and Part XII, April 2009, of the California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual. Culvert replacement or modification designs shall be visually reviewed and authorized by NOAA Fisheries (or CDFG) engineers prior to commencement of work.
- 8. All habitat improvements shall be in accordance with techniques described in the Third Edition, January 1998, of the *California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual*. Planting of tree seedlings shall take place after December 1 or when sufficient rainfall has occurred to ensure the best chance of survival of the seedlings. The standard for success is 80% survival of plantings or 80% ground cover for broadcast planting of seed, after a period of three years.
- 9. The Grantee shall maintain the modifications and inspect the project site for obstructions to fish passage in a timely manner and remove debris as necessary during the storm season.
- 10. Prior to the contractor selection process, the Grantee will need to define the role of the HDR engineering staff during construction. All contractors bidding on the project should understand that the design engineer(s) will be given the authority to direct the selection and placement of all rock during that phase of the project. During the selection process, the Grantee should select the contractor with prior experience installing bridges and bottomless arched culverts and rock weirs or the most comparable construction experience with regards to building rock weirs since this component is critical to the success and durability of the project.
- 11. Project Description and Tasks NMFS requires submittal and approval of five specific implementation plans prior to beginning construction: Dewatering, Erosion Control, Fish Removal, Maintenance and Monitoring and Re-vegetation plans. The plans will also be reviewed and approved by CDFG. Submittal of these plans will occur once the designs are finalized. Specific construction tasks are as follows:
 - Fish relocation, if necessary
 - Installation of the stream bypass system
 - Grubbing and cleaning of the site
 - Removal of the existing crossing
 - Excavation for and construction of the foundations for the bottomless-arched culvert
 - Excavation and installation of the two riffles and two weirs
 - Installation of the 60-ft. bottomless-arched culvert
 - Loading of the arch and road rehabilitation
 - Installation of the rock protection for the arch foundations
 - Placement of the embankment fill
 - Asphalting the road
 - Anti-graffiti treatment of the bottomless arched culvert
 - Installation of the guardrails
 - Site clean up
 - Re-vegetation of the site with native plants
- 12. Any modification to the design that occurs during construction must be approved by the design engineers and either David Crowder, NMFS engineer (805-534-3227), or Marcin Whitman, DFG Engineer (916-445-3832), in writing prior to the change being implemented. The Grantor's Grant Manager will also be notified by telephone at (562) 342-7186. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of the grant.

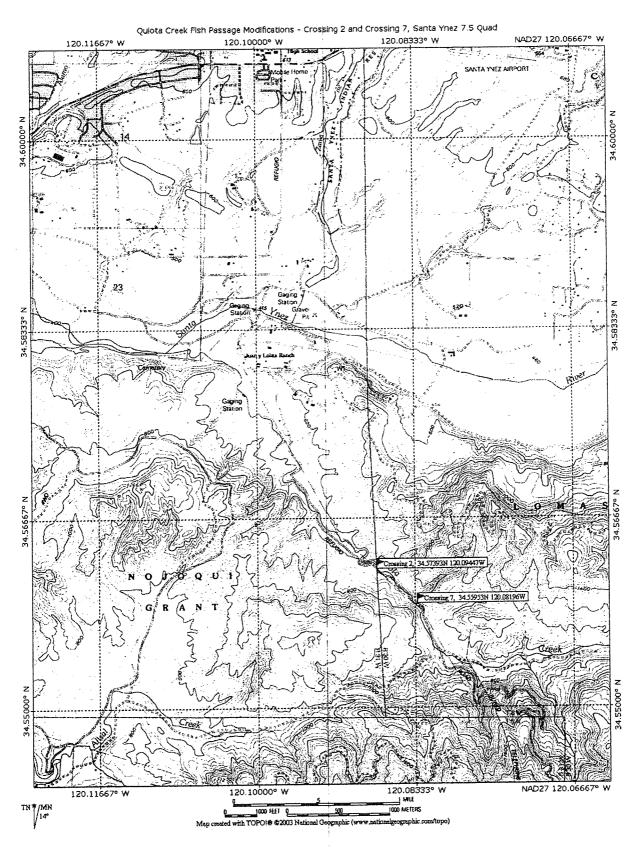
- 13. **Deliverables:** Upon completion of the project, the Grantee shall provide all final design plans, asbuilt construction drawings, a final construction report, and project photos from pre, during and post construction. The resulting reports and final invoices will be delivered to the Grantor's Grant Manager no later than March 1, 2013. **An electronic copy of all material will also be submitted. All project photographs will also be included (as jpeg files) on the CD.**
- 14. Submit a progress report to the Grantor's Grant Manager at least once a month. Invoices can be submitted monthly or in 3-month increments but not for periods of greater length. When submitting an invoice, a record of in-kind funds or services provided during the invoice period must also be included.
- 15. Upon completion of the project, the Grantee shall submit two (2) hard copies of a final written report and one (1) electronic, Microsoft Word compatible, on a CD. All data collected and created for this grant is a required deliverable of this grant and will become the property of the Department of Fish and Game, and not of the Grantee. A condition of final payment on this grant shall include the delivery of all related data. The report shall not be considered final until approved and accepted by the grant manager. The report shall include, but not necessarily be limited to the following information: 1) Grant number; (2) Project name; (3) Geographic area (e.g., watershed name); (4) Location of work - show project location using U.S.G.S. 7.5 minute topographical map or appropriately scaled topographical map; (5) Geospatial reference/location (lat/long is preferred defined as point, line, or polygon); (6) Project start and end dates; (7) Total of each fund source, by line item, expended to complete the project, breaking down Grant dollars, by line item, and any other funding, including type of match (cash or in-kind service); (8) Total number of volunteer hours; dollar value of volunteer work; description of how the dollar value of the volunteer labor was determined; dollar value of non-volunteer donated labor; and description and dollar value of non-labor in-kind contributions to the project; (9) Expected benefits to anadromous salmonids from the project; (10) Labeled before and after photographs of any restoration activities and techniques; (11) Specific project access using public and private roads and trails, with landowner name and address; (12) Complete as built project description; and (13) Report measurable metrics for the project by responding to the restoration project metrics listed below.

Fish Passage at Stream Crossings (FP)

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Cachuma Operation and Maintenance Board (COMB) is a California Joint Powers Authority organized under the provisions of California Government Code Section 6500 et seq., with power to acquire, contract for improvements, own, develop, and operate facilities for projects undertaken by its Member Units; and

WHEREAS, in August, 1997, the National Marine Fisheries Service ("NMFS") listed anadromous steelhead in the Southern California Evolutionarily Significant Unit, including the Santa Ynez River downstream of Bradbury Dam, as an endangered species under the Federal Endangered Species Act and, completed and issued on September 11, 2000, a Biological Opinion relative to Cachuma Project operations as they relate to steelhead; and

WHEREAS, COMB is committed to implement and cooperate in project operations and other management actions designed to protect and enhance habitat conditions for steelhead in the Santa Ynez River and its tributaries downstream of Bradbury Dam; and

WHEREAS, the fish passage improvements at Crossing Number Seven on Quiota Creek, a tributary to the Lower Santa Ynez River, will provide improved access to the perennial reaches of Quiota Creek and restore habitat to enhance conditions for steelhead; and

WHEREAS, the California Department of Fish and Game authorized disbursement of up to \$442,736 to COMB for removal of a passage impediment/barrier for endangered steelhead at Crossing Number Seven on Quiota Creek; and

WHEREAS, COMB has prepared a detailed Scope of Work with the specific tasks to be performed, a schedule of completion, and a detailed budget that will be used in a competitive bidding process for selection of a construction contractor, and construction management of the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. The Board of Directors of COMB supports the Fish Passage Improvements on Quiota Creek Crossing Number Seven and these are considered essential to the

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steelhead restoration effort in the lower Santa Ynez River.

- 2. The Board of Directors of COMB approves entering into an agreement with the California Department of Fish and Game for the purpose of implementing the project in accordance with this agreement.
- 3. The General Manager/Secretary of COMB is authorized to execute this agreement and approve its terms and conditions on behalf of COMB, and to contract for such services as may be required to carry out the project using the approved funds.
- 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

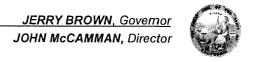

- 9. Prevailing wages may be required to be paid on certain types of projects, typically Public Works projects. Existing law defines "public works," as, among other things, construction, alteration, demolition, installation, or repair work done under contract and paid for in whole or in part out of public funds.

California Fish and Game Code section 1501.5 exempts from the prevailing wage requirements, contracts with public agencies, nonprofit organizations, or Indian tribes that exceed \$50,000 in cost, excluding the cost of gravel. 14. The Grant Manager may require the Grantee to submit progress reports as often as deemed necessary, but not more often than once a month. If the project is not completed in the current year, the Grantee will submit a summary of the completed portion no later than November 30 and again each year until completed.

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- 15. Grant disbursements will be made to the Grantee in arrears, upon receipt by the Grant Manager of an original itemized invoice. Invoices may not be submitted more frequently than monthly, in arrears, with the exception of the invoice for final retention (see #19). The invoice shall contain the following information:
 - a. The word "Invoice" should appear in a prominent location at the top of the page(s);
 - b. Printed name of the Grantee;
 - c. Business address of the Grantee including P.O. Box, City, State, and Zip Code;
 - d. Name of the Region/Division of the Department of Fish and Game being billed;
 - e. The date of the invoice and the time period covered; i.e., the term "from" and "to";
 - f. The number of the Grant upon which the claim is based;
 - g. The invoice must be itemized using the categories and following the format of the budget in Exhibit B. The amounts billed on the invoice must be tied to a specific element in the Statement of Work and the deliverable must be measurable.
 - h. The total amount due. This should be in a prominent location in the lower right-hand portion of the last page and clearly distinguished from other figures or computations appearing on the invoice. The total amount due shall include all costs incurred by the Grantee under the terms of this grant;
 - i. The original signature of the Grantee (not required of established firms or entities using preprinted letterhead invoices);
 - j. The Grantee must provide supporting documentation for the invoice and actual receipts upon request of the Grant Manager.
- 16. The Grantee agrees that all data, plans, drawings, specifications, reports, computer programs, operating manuals, notes and other written or graphic work produced in the performance of this Agreement, are subject to the rights of the State as set forth in this section. The State shall have the right to reproduce, publish, and use all such work, or any part thereof, in any manner and for any purposes whatsoever and to authorize others to do so.
- 17. Grantee agrees that all travel and per diem paid its employees under this Grant shall be at rates not to exceed those amounts paid to the State's represented employees under collective bargaining agreements currently in effect.
- 18. Each invoice for payment must be accompanied by a written description, not to exceed two pages in length, of the Grantee's performance under this grant since the time the previous such report was prepared. The report shall describe the types of activities and specific accomplishments during the period for which the payment is being made rather than merely listing the number of hours worked during the reporting period. The final invoice must include a budget summary of cost share expenditures by fund source.
- 19. Grantor shall withhold ten percent (10%) from each and every payment pending fulfillment of the Grantee's obligations herein. Upon completion of the Grantee's obligations, the Grantee must invoice for the payment retention.
- 20. Any disputes concerning the project or the Grant shall be resolved by the Project Managers of the Grantor and Grantee. In the event the dispute cannot be resolved by the Project Managers, the dispute shall be referred to the Director of the Department of Fish and Game, whose decision will be final.
- 21. The Grantee shall maintain complete and accurate records of its actual project costs and shall retain said records throughout the term of the Grant and for a period of three (3) years after receipt of final payment. In order to ensure objective subcontract performance and eliminate unfair competitive advantage, subcontractors that develop or draft work requirements, statements of work, or requests for proposals shall be excluded from competing for such subcontracts.
- 23. If a subcontractor is used, then a written copy of the sub agreement must be submitted to the Grant Manager, prior to the commencement of work by the subcontractor. The subcontract must include specific language which establishes the rights of the auditors of the State to examine the records of the subcontractor relative to the services and materials provided under the grant.
- 24. The Grantee and any subcontractors shall permit the Grantor to review and inspect project activities at all reasonable times during the performance period of this Grant, including review and inspection on a daily basis.
- 25. The project specifications subject to this Grant may only be amended in writing by mutual agreement of the Grantor and Grantee. If any change in the terms and conditions become necessary, a written request shall be made to the Grant Manager no later than six months prior to term end.
- 26. The Grantor may terminate the Grant upon giving thirty (30) days written notice to the Grantee. In case of early termination, a final payment will be made to the Grantee upon receipt of an invoice covering costs incurred up to notice of termination, based on the portion of work completed.
- 27. A Grantee's name and address may be provided to the public if requested. Other personal information submitted on this grant may be released to governmental entities involved with the funding of the project, for law enforcement purposes, pursuant to court order, or for official natural resources management purposes.
 - A Grantee may obtain a copy of his/her Grant file maintained by the Grantor by submitting a written request to the Department of Fish and Game, Fisheries Branch, Fisheries Restoration Grant Program, 830 "S" Street, Sacramento, CA 95811. All requests must include the requestor's name, address, and telephone number.
- 28. The Grantee shall comply with all applicable state laws, rules, regulations, and local ordinances specifically including but not limited to environmental, procurement and safety laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances. As may be necessary, the Grantee shall be responsible for obtaining the services of appropriately licensed professionals to comply with the applicable requirements of the Business and Professions Code including but not limited to section 6700 et seq. (Professional Engineers Act) and/or section 7800 et seq. (Geologists and Geophysicists Act).

If the Grantee fails to perform in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, the Grantor retains the right, at its sole discretion, to delay, interrupt, or suspend the work for which the grant monies are supplied.

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EXHIBIT A QUIOTA CREEK FISH PASSAGE IMPROVEMENT – CROSSING 7 STATEMENT OF WORK

Under direction of the Grantor, and under the following conditions and terms, the Grantee will:

- 1. Cachuma Operations and Maintenance Board, and its contractors, will improve access to 1.46 miles of perennial spawning and rearing habitat for southern steelhead by removing the keystone barrier at Crossing 7 within the Quiota Creek watershed, a tributary to the Santa Ynez River in Santa Barbara County. The proposed project is the removal of a temporary bridge and grade control structure and replacement with a 60-foot bottomless-arched culvert with two in-stream weirs for grade control with a maximum jump height of 1-foot between each weir. The resulting structure is designed to convey the 50-year flood with one foot of freeboard, while providing natural stream function and unlimited fish passage for the determined fish passage flows of 1 to 148 cfs. The bottomless culvert and the rock weirs structures are also designed to withstand the 100-yr flood event.
- Conduct work on Quiota Creek crossing number 7 approximately 2.78 miles upstream from the confluence of the Santa Ynez River. The project is located in Township 6N, Range 30W of the Santa Ynez 7.5 Minute U.S.G.S. Quadrangle, Latitude and Longitude 34.55953 N, 120.08196 W as depicted in Attachment 1, Project Location Map, which is attached and made part of this agreement by this reference.
- 3. If the project will not be completed by March 31, 2013, and therefore the grantee will be requesting an amendment for time, this request and a justification for the delay resulting in the time request must be submitted no later than December 1, 2012. The written request shall be sent to the Grant Manager.
- 4. The Grantee shall not proceed with on the ground implementation until all necessary permits and consultations are secured, and they have received a notice to proceed from the Grantor's Project Manager.
- 5. In instances where water is present in the work area, the Grantee shall notify the Grantor's Project Manager a minimum of **five working days** before the project site is de-watered and the stream flow diverted. The notification shall provide a reasonable time for Department personnel to supervise the implementation of the water diversion plan and oversee the safe removal and relocation of salmonids and other fish life from the project area. If the project requires dewatering of the site, and the relocation of salmonids, the Grantee shall implement the following measures to minimize harm and mortality to listed salmonids:
 - Fish relocation and dewatering activities shall only occur between June 15 and October 31 of each year.
 - The Grantee shall minimize the amount of wetted stream channel dewatered at each individual project site to the fullest extent possible.
 - The Grantee shall provide fish relocation data to the Grantor's Project Manager on a form provided by the Department of Fish and Game.
 - Additional measures to minimize injury and mortality of salmonids during fish relocation and dewatering activities shall be implemented as described in Part IX, pages 52 and 53 of the California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual.
- 6. Work in flowing streams is restricted to June 15 through October 31 unless otherwise specified in the Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement issued by the Department and with the concurrence of the federal permitting agencies.

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- 7. The project shall follow the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS 2001) Guidelines for Salmonid Passage at Stream Crossings and DFG criteria for fish passage as described in the Third Edition, Volume II, Part IX, February 2003 and Part XII, April 2009, of the *California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual*. Culvert replacement or modification designs shall be visually reviewed and authorized by NOAA Fisheries (or CDFG) engineers prior to commencement of work.
- 8. All habitat improvements shall be in accordance with techniques described in the Third Edition, January 1998, of the California Salmonid Stream Habitat Restoration Manual. Planting of tree seedlings shall take place after December 1 or when sufficient rainfall has occurred to insure the best chance of survival of the seedlings. The standard for success is 80% survival of plantings or 80% ground cover for broadcast planting of seed, after a period of three years.
- 9. The Grantee shall maintain the modifications and inspect the project site for obstructions to fish passage in a timely manner and remove debris as necessary during the storm season.
- 10. Prior to the contractor selection process, the grantee will need to define the role of the HDR engineering staff during construction. All contractors bidding on the project should understand that the design engineer(s) will be given the authority to direct the selection and placement of all rock during that phase of the project. During the selection process, the grantee should select the contractor with prior experience installing bridges and bottomless arched culverts and rock weirs or the most comparable construction experience with regards to building rock weirs since this component is critical to the success and durability of the project.
- 11. Project Description and Tasks NMFS requires submittal and approval of five specific implementation plans prior to beginning construction: Dewatering, Erosion Control, Fish Removal, Maintenance and Monitoring and Re-vegetation plans. The plans will also be reviewed and approved by CDFG. Submittal of these plans will occur once the designs are finalized. Specific construction tasks are as follows:
 - Fish relocation, if necessary
 - Installation of the stream bypass system
 - Grubbing and cleaning of the site
 - Removal of the existing crossing
 - Excavation for and construction of the foundations for the bottomless-arched culvert
 - · Excavation and installation of the two riffles and two weirs
 - Installation of the 60-ft bottomless-arched culvert
 - Loading of the arch and road rehabilitation
 - Installation of the rock protection for the arch foundations
 - Placement of the embankment fill
 - Asphalting the road
 - Anti-graffiti treatment of the bottomless arched culvert
 - Installation of the guardrails
 - Site clean up
 - Re-vegetation of the site with native plants
- 12. Any modification to the design that occurs during construction must be approved by the design engineers and either David Crowder, NMFS engineer (805-534-3227), or Marcin Whitman, DFG Engineer (916-445-3832), in writing prior to the change being implemented. The grantor's project manager will also be notified by telephone (562)342-7186. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of the grant.

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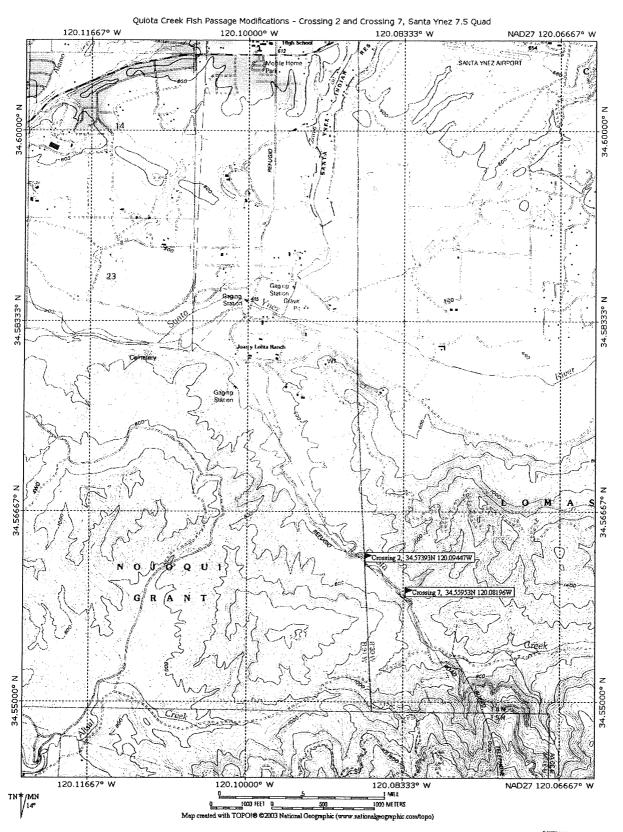
- 13. **Deliverables:** Upon completion of the project, the Grantee shall provide all final design plans, asbuilt construction drawings, a final construction report, and project photos from pre, during and post construction. The resulting reports and final invoices will be delivered to the Grantor's Project Manager no later than March 1, 2013. **An electronic copy of all material will also be submitted. All project photographs will also be included (as jpeg files) on the CD.**
- 14. Submit a progress report to the Grantor's Project Manager at least once a month. Invoices can be submitted monthly or in 3-month increments but not for periods of greater length. When submitting an invoice, a record of in-kind funds or services provided during the invoice period must also be included.
- 15. Upon completion of the project, the Grantee shall submit two (2) hard copies of a final written report and one (1) electronic, Microsoft Word compatible, on a CD. All data collected and created for this grant is a required deliverable of this grant and will become the property of the Department of Fish and Game, and not of the grantee. A condition of final payment on this grant shall include the delivery of all related data. The report shall not be considered final until approved and accepted by the grant manager. The report shall include, but not necessarily be limited to the following information: 1) Grant number; (2) Project name; (3) Geographic area (e.g., watershed name); (4) Location of work – show project location using U.S.G.S. 7.5 minute topographical map or appropriately scaled topographical map; (5) Geospatial reference/location (lat/long is preferred defined as point, line, or polygon); (6) Project start and end dates; (7) Total of each fund source, by line item, expended to complete the project, breaking down Grant dollars, by line item, and any other funding, including type of match (cash or in-kind service); (8) Total number of volunteer hours; dollar value of volunteer work; description of how the dollar value of the volunteer labor was determined; dollar value of non-volunteer donated labor; and description and dollar value of non-labor in-kind contributions to the project; (9) Expected benefits to anadromous salmonids from the project; (10) Labeled before and after photographs of any restoration activities and techniques. (11) Specific project access using public and private roads and trails, with landowner name and address; (12) Complete as built project description; and (13) Report measurable metrics for the project by responding to the restoration project metrics listed below.

Fish Passage at Stream Crossings (FP)

- Miles of stream treated (include only the actual length of stream *treated* by the project, not the length of stream *affected* by the project);
- Total number of stream crossings/culverts treated to improve fish passage;
- Type(s) of crossings treated, select from: culvert; bridge; or ford;
- Miles of stream made more accessible by treating stream crossings (accessible to next barrier or to upstream end of anadromy);
- Number of culverts replaced/improved;
- Number of bridges installed/improved;
- Number of rocked fords placed;
- Number of road crossings removed;
- If monitoring was included in the project:
 - Type of monitoring, select from: implementation monitoring; compliance monitoring-engineering design; compliance monitoring-project design; pretreatment monitoring; post treatment monitoring; salmonid monitoring; non-salmonid biological monitoring; water flow monitoring; or physical monitoring; and

- 16. The Grantee will acknowledge the participation of the Department of Fish and Game, Fisheries Restoration Grant Program funds on any signs, flyers, or other types of written communication or notice to advertise or explain the project.

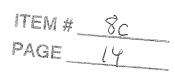

Recommendation:

- 1. Consider options to allow the 2nd Pipeline Project to move forward. Staff recommendation:
 - Request the GWD, the City of Santa Barbara, and MWD to provide a
 definitive answer as soon as possible regarding their approval of the 2nd
 Pipeline Project expenditure without CVWD's participation.
 - b. If GWD, the City of Santa Barbara, and MWD approve the project, request Blois Construction to extend its bid for another 60 days to April 13, 2011.
 - c. If they do not approve the project expenditure, reject all bids and select Option 2: Postpone the project for two years and hire a consultant to carry out a comprehensive cost of services/cost benefit analysis of the entire SCC system.
 - d. Withdraw from the SWRCB Grant Agreement for Prop 50 and forego \$3.2 million dollars in grant funds for the 2nd Pipeline Project.
- 2. Consider options if the 2nd Pipeline Project does not go forward. Staff recommendation:
 - a. Reject all bids.
 - b. Select Option 4: Budget in FY 2011-12 to replace or rehabilitate deteriorated structures, valves and laterals in the uppermost reach of the SCC above Corona Del Mar Water Treatment Plant.
 - c. Release hold on FY 2010-11 budgeted funds to complete the design work and develop an Emergency Action Plan for the 48 inch pipeline from the south portal to Corona Del Mar Water Treatment Plant.
 - d. Budget in FY 2011-12 to develop emergency repair/rehabilitation plans for other vulnerable sections of the SCC.
 - e. Withdraw from the SWRCB Grant Agreement for Prop 50 and forego \$3.2 million dollars in grant funds for the 2nd Pipeline Project.

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Discussion:

Carpinteria Valley Water District Participation in the Project

A background chronology of for approval of the 2nd Pipeline Project is attached. A letter from President Hanson to June Van Wingerden requesting CVWD to reconsider its decision to participate in funding the 2nd Pipeline Project, and Ms Van Wingerdens' reply letter are also attached.

Although CVWD's answer was to confirm that it will not participate in funding the project, some constructive suggestions were made. These are not new ideas, and COMB staff has recognized these needs for some time. AECOM's Reliability Studies identified and prioritized many needed capital improvement projects to repair and rehabilitate the SCC system, which was why the initial bond issuance suggested by staff included several projects to meet the most critical needs. COMB staff is currently developing a Ten Year CIP Program using the Reliability Studies as the basis for the program, which will be used for planning and budgeting purposes to get the SCC system back to its original condition. Carrying out the program work will be dependent upon funding availability. Much of if should be able to be covered in annual budgeted work, however large projects, such as the 2nd Pipeline Project and the Mission Creek Pipeline Project will require financing.

Options to Allow the Project to Move Forward

- 1. Request GWD, City of Santa Barbara, and MWD to consider approval of the project expenditure to determine if they will fund the project without CVWD's participation.
 - If the three agencies still agree to fund the project, request a 4th extension to Blois Construction's bid to allow time to complete the 106 permit process and issue a bond for the project.
 - No effect on Prop 50 grant funds.
- 2. Postpone the project for two years and budget for a consultant to carry out a comprehensive cost of services/cost benefit analysis of the entire SCC system, including the 2nd Pipeline Project, to begin in July 2011. It is anticipated that the study would take about a year.
 - This would include a hydraulic flow capacity analysis of the SCC, but would also
 evaluate other potential inequities borne by one or more of the south coast
 member units.
 - Revisit cost sharing allocations for all south coast member units for all SCC work (capital improvements and annual O&M) when the study is completed.
 - Reject all bids for construction of the project at this time, and rebid the project if
 the south coast member units reach agreement on potentially revised cost
 sharing allocations based on the conclusions of the cost benefit analysis.
 - Prop 50 grant funds would not be available.
- 3. Postpone the project for 12 months and budget for a consultant to carry out a cost of services/cost benefit analysis for the 2nd Pipeline Project only to begin in July 2011.
 - This would include a hydraulic flow capacity analysis of the SCC. Although COMB's Engineer could contribute to the analysis, Mr. Colton is not a hydraulic engineer nor does COMB have an economic expert on staff to carry out the cost benefit part of the analysis. Therefore, a consultant would need to be hired unless one of the member units has members of their staff that could carry out these analyses.
 - Revisit cost sharing allocations for all south coast member units for the 2nd
 Pipeline Project when the study is completed.

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- Reject all bids for construction of the project at this time, and rebid the project if the south coast member units reach agreement on potentially revised cost allocations for the 2nd Pipeline Project based on the conclusions of the analysis.
- Prop 50 grant funds may be available given SWRCB approval of a one year extension to March 2013.

Options If Project Does Not Go Forward

- 1. Abandon the project all together.
- 2. Design and develop plans for an emergency pipeline failure, and purchase all necessary materials and pipe sections. Design work to address an emergency pipeline failure for the 48" pipe has been completed and is under review. Some modifications to the designs are needed. Development of an Emergency Action Plan was budgeted for this fiscal year, but is currently on hold.
- 3. Carry out risk analysis to determine impacts to life and property in case of pipeline failure.
- 4. Budget in FY 2011-12 to replace or rehabilitate deteriorated structures, valves and laterals in the uppermost reach of the SCC above Corona Del Mar Water Treatment Plant: e.g. replace south portal structure, replace corroded valves and laterals and rehabilitate the structures. This would require a shut down periods and installation of a bypass line.
- 5. Withdraw from the SWRCB Grant Agreement for Prop 50 and forego \$3.2 million dollars in grant funds for the 2nd Pipeline Project. It is unknown if the funds would go back to the state or be reapportioned among the other grant recipients.
- 6. Attempt to combine a suite of substitute projects of benefit to the south coast, and request that the SWRCB, the County Water Agency, and the 28 Prop 50 partners approve these substitute projects for use of the \$3.2 million in Prop 50 grant funds. At this late date in the process, staff believes it is unlikely that there would be any support for this approach or if other projects would meet the project criteria established by the Santa Barbara Region IRWMP.

Construction Bid

The low bidder for the 2nd Pipeline Project is Blois Construction, Inc. The bid specification document stated that COMB had to accept, reject, or mutually agree to an extension with the apparent low bidder within 90 days, which was August 16, 2010. Due to the long delay in getting a NHPA Section 106 permit approved by Reclamation, Blois Construction and COMB have mutually agreed to extend the award of the bid three times with a current extension date of February 12, 2011. Although substantial progress has been made toward completing the Section 106 permit process and the NEPA EIS process, neither is quite completed due to a delay in SHPO sending a letter of concurrence of no adverse effect. It is expected that all permits and the Record of Decision will be approved within the next month. Reclamation can then issue a construction permit for the project. Therefore, if the project is approved by the funding agencies, a fourth extension of the bid is needed.

However, CVWD has reaffirmed that it will not participate in funding the 2nd Pipeline Project. As a result, it is highly unlikely that all of the other south coast member units will agree to approve the project expenditure. In the event that one or more of the Member Units does not approve the project, the Board would need to reject all bids.

Conclusion

A definitive answer is needed from GWD, the City of Santa Barbara, and MWD regarding their approval of the 2nd Pipeline Project without CVWD's participation. If the answer is yes, the Board may request Mr. Blois to extend his bid for another 60 days. If the answer is no, all bids should be rejected, and one of the other options considered.

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Of the options for the 2nd Pipeline Project to move forward, I would recommend Option 2 - a comprehensive cost of services/cost benefit analysis of the entire SCC system. In my opinion, evaluating the 2nd Pipeline Project only is not appropriate, as it isolates one project only. There have been many other cost sharing inequities in the past based on Cachuma entitlement percentages for COMB's O&M and capital expenditures that have been brought forward by various member unit managers that I believe should also be evaluated in terms of a cost/benefit analysis.

I would not recommend abandoning the 2nd Pipeline Project, as it is the first and most important infrastructure improvement needed for the SCC. Budgeted funds to complete the design work and develop an Emergency Action Plan should be made available. If the project does not go forward, I would recommend budgeting in FY 2011-12 money to replace the south portal structure, and replace or rehabilitate deteriorated structures, valves, and laterals in the uppermost reach of the SCC above Corona Del Mar Water Treatment Plant. Other vulnerable sections of the SCC should also have emergency repair/rehabilitation plans developed.

All of this proposed work will require funding from the south coast member units. COMB has no reserve funds to carry out any of the work or studies described.

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CHRONOLOGY OF 2ND PIPELINE PROJECT FUNDING ISSUES January 24, 2011

Background

Based on Reliability and Feasibility studies completed for two sections of the SCC, which identified several critical capital improvement projects needed for the SCC facilities, COMB staff developed a recommendation that COMB issue a bond for approximately \$18M (depending on interest rates and repayment amount) to fund about 7 priority capital improvement projects. The total amount of the bond was to be dependent upon keeping the annual repayment amount at \$1M per year. We suggested that the annual special project line item on the COMB budget, which had been running about \$1.5M per year, be reallocated to include a \$1M bond repayment line item and a \$500K special project line item, the latter of which would be designed to pay for smaller project work. The actual amount of the bond would be backed into to maintain a \$1M bond repayment, so that the COMB budget for that line item would remain flat until the designated capital improvement projects could be completed. We estimated that would take about 5 years, after which time the capital portion of the budget would need to increase to continue additional capital improvement work, if authorized by the Board. This approach was proposed so that the Member Units' budgets would not be impacted due to COMB's bond issue for 5 years, and to allow us to complete the highest priority projects in the relatively near future.

After many months of discussion with the COMB Board and presentations to the South Coast Member Unit Boards, this recommended approach was accepted by COMB. COMB hired a financial advisor and bond counsel in mid-2008 to begin the financial preparations, however, in September 2008, the stock market crashed, and all funding discussions came to an abrupt halt until the market settled down. By March 2009, the bond market had rebounded sufficiently, and interest rates were very favorable, particularly for municipal bonds.

In about May/June 2009, Charles Hamilton presented an alternate cost sharing proposal to the other south coast General Managers and to the CVWD Board for the COMB bond capital improvement projects, particularly for the 2nd Pipeline Project. He was of the opinion that CVWD should pay less that its historic entitlement share of the cost (12.2%), primarily because other agencies were using a greater capacity of the SCC to convey non-Cachuma Project water deliveries than was CVWD. In his opinion, and that of the CVWD Board, those agencies should, therefore, pay a greater percentage of the construction costs. He was also of the opinion that CVWD would not benefit from the 2nd Pipeline Project as much as the other south coast member units, so suggested that CVWD pay a smaller percentage (than its normal entitlement percentage) of the cost. The other member unit mangers did not agree that this was equitable.

The COMB Board considered CVWD's request in June and July 2009 but did not think it was appropriate to evaluate an alternate cost sharing methodology for repayment of the bond without considering all the other potential inequities that might have affected the other Member Units. However, to be responsive to CVWD's request, the Board voted unanimously to carry out a comprehensive cost of services/cost benefit analysis for the entire SCC system, including an

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evaluation of the cost distribution for repayment of the bond, and to hire a consultant for a not-to-exceed amount of \$80,000. Staff was directed to prepare a scope of work immediately after the bonds were sold. The Board also authorized a provision to be added to COMB's Preliminary Official Statement and to the Joint Participation Agreements which would allow a change to the bond repayment percentages at a later time, if the participating Member Units decided it was appropriate. The COMB Board (with the exception of CVWD) did not want this potentially time-consuming cost benefit analysis to hold up issuance of the bond or construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project. They agreed to carry out this evaluation to address the equity issues raised by CVWD, but only if CVWD participated in the COMB bond issuance. Upon its completion, COMB and the Member Units would decide if any adjustments to the historic entitlement cost sharing percentages were warranted.

During September 2009, cost sharing allocations were explored by the Member Unit General Managers, and a joint meeting between COMB and CVWD was held to try and reach resolution with CVWD so that they would participate in bond issuance. That meeting resulted in general consensus of all Directors present that COMB would consider the following to address the equity issues raised by CVWD: 1) preparation of a current prioritized list of bond projects with a commitment to do the Montecito/Carpinteria reach projects on a parity with the Second Pipeline Project and the Mission Creek Project; 2) development of a process to be facilitated/coordinated by COMB to bring La Cumbre, Raytheon, and Morehart into the "paying" Cachuma community; 3) and develop a strategy that would lead to an agreement among the Member Units to govern water deliveries during peak demand periods with a "surcharge" to be paid by agencies that didn't follow the program. COMB passed a resolution to this effect at its September meeting.

I believe that the COMB Board made every effort to accommodate CVWD's requests throughout this process by including structure rehabilitation and lateral work on the SCC in the Carpinteria reach as a priority project to be funded by the bond, by hiring a Financial Advisor at Charles' request, by agreeing to carry out a cost of services/cost-benefit analysis of the SCC conveyance facilities, and by passing Resolution 496 to address the equity issues raised by CVWD, albeit after the bond issuance.

These recommendations were ultimately unacceptable to the CVWD Board, which in November 2009 declined all participation in funding its share of the 2nd Pipeline Project, as provided under the COMB JPA because a unanimous vote is required for any financial obligation or expenditure over \$1M. However, CVWD did agree to consider paying its normal entitlement share of the other proposed bond projects. Without CVWD's commitment to pay its share of the 2nd Pipeline Project, the other south coast Member Units would not agree to finance the other priority capital improvement projects, and decided instead to limit the bond issuance to pay for construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project only. With CVWD's withdrawal from the project, the COMB Board decided there was also no longer a need to carry out the cost of services/cost benefit analysis or address the equity issues specified in Resolution 496.

CVWD's vote was not well received by the other Member Units, but after much deliberation by the GWD Board, City Council, and MWD Board, these three agencies agreed to fund the total cost of the project themselves, fully acknowledging the inequity, but recognizing the importance and necessity of constructing the 2nd Pipeline Project. MWD decided to pay its share in cash through a Contribution Agreement, and GWD and the City decided to bond for their respective cost shares. Approval of the COMB bond issuance for these three agencies came before each board/council twice, where objections to CVWD's decision were fully discussed. But in the end each board approved COMB's bond issue both times.

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Due to ID1's objections regarding COMB carrying out fisheries projects, approval of the bond by COMB was delayed several months. Eventually, all Member Unit Boards/Council approved COMB's bond issuance. Finally, in March 2010, the COMB Board voted approved the following by unanimous vote:

Resolution No. 501 to Approve the COMB 2010 Revenue Bond and Related Legal Documents and Agreements for the SCC Upper Reach Reliability Project (2nd Pipeline Project)

- a. Comb Indenture of Trust
- b. Goleta Water District Joint Participation Agreement
- c. City of Santa Barbara Joint Participation Agreement
- d. COMB Purchase Contract Citigroup Global Markets, Inc.
- e. COMB Continuing Disclosure Agreement Bank of New York Mellon Trust Company
- f. COMB Preliminary Official Statement
- g. Montecito Water District Contribution Agreement
- h. Bond Indemnification Agreement

Future Approvals Needed

Because the COMB JPA requires a unanimous vote for any financial obligation over \$1M or any expenditure over \$1M, our attorneys have indicated that two rounds of approvals are needed. The COMB bond issuance has already been approved by all Member Units and by COMB. However, another round of approvals is still needed for the project expenditure. This must also be a unanimous by the COMB Board and a majority approval by each of the member unit boards/council.

Revisiting CVWD's Participation in Funding the 2nd Pipeline Project

In late September 2010, I met with John McInnes and Lauren Hanson. Several questions were raised regarding ownership of the 2nd Pipeline Project, COMB's authority as owner of the new section of pipeline, and how costs were going to be attributed for any agency using the 2nd Pipeline but not paying for it. The three funding agencies met on November 5th to discuss the conditions under which non-funding agencies may use the 2nd Pipeline, if COMB can charge fees for wheeling water through the 2nd Pipeline, O&M of the 2nd Pipeline, and in the case of CVWD, payment of its share of the capital cost for construction of the project. A legal opinion was prepared by Bill Hair regarding COMB's authority which basically indicated that COMB has the authority to levy conveyance and O&M fees, but charging for repayment of the capital cost of the project was less clear.

Mr. McInnes requested that fee agreements with COMB be in place up <u>prior to</u> the Member Units considering approval of the project expenditure. We expect to finally have all permits in hand by mid-February, so there is very little time to get these agreements in place. We discussed potential agreements with La Cumbre, Raytheon, and Morehart over a year ago, but they were not pursued when Bert Bertrando indicated that if any agency entered into an agreement with these agencies, it would be GWD – not COMB. Therefore, conveyance and O&M fees for these agencies might be handled through GWD, as they are in the GWD service area. This needs further discussion.

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But more importantly, as a matter of equity because CVWD will benefit from the 2nd Pipeline Project when it is in service, Mr. McInnes requested that CVWD revisit its decision not to participate in the funding of it, and seriously consider repayment options to pay its share of the capital cost of the project. This was discussed with all south coast Member Unit General Managers on December 9, 2010, and a recommendation was made that the COMB Board send a letter to CVWD to that effect.

CVWD Funding Options

Several funding options might be considered. They include:

- 1. CVWD participates in the 30 year COMB bond for 12.2% of the total project cost, not to exceed \$11M, with GWD and the City. COMB will carry the debt.
- 2. CVWD enters into a Contribution Agreement with COMB to pay 12.2% of the total project cost, not to exceed \$11M.
- 3. GWD, the City, and MWD front CVWD's share of the capital cost, and CVWD enters into an agreement with COMB to repay its 12.2% plus interest over 30 years. CVWD's payments will be returned proportionately to GWD, the City, and MWD.

Summary

The 2nd Pipeline Project is essential to COMB's ability to provide water through the SCC system during the summer. Without the City also providing water from Gibraltar into Lauro Reservoir to keep it full, COMB may not be able to meet demand during the peak periods lasting more than a few days from the SCC. Gibraltar is silting in and will be going into pass through mode in the near future. Therefore, it is necessary to restore the original flow capacity to the SCC to assure water deliveries during peak demand periods. The 2nd Pipeline Project is also needed to provide a redundant section of pipeline at the top of the system where it cannot readily be taken out of service so that the existing section of SCC can be maintained and rehabilitated, to provide a new section of pipe in case the original pipeline is damaged by earthquakes or landslides, and to replace the degraded south portal structure. Two other flow capacity projects should be done at the same time to fully restore the original design flows in the SCC rehabilitation of three vent structures and modifications to the piping at Ortega, Sheffield and Lauro control stations. However, these projects were put aside when the funding agencies opted to bond for the 2nd Pipeline Project only. The 2nd Pipeline is the most important and expensive of these pipeline capacity projects, and has the other benefits mentioned above associated with it. But due to its price tag, it cannot be funded from budgeted funds.

To date, all engineering drawings have been completed, the final EIR has been approved and certified by COMB, Reclamation has completed a revision of the final EIS and the Notice of Availability was posted in the Federal Register for 30 days, ending January 10, 2011; the Record of Decision is pending issuance of the Section 106 permit, mitigation and monitoring plans are complete, the oak tree revegetation plan has already begun and acorns have been collected and nurseried, non-native vegetation removal in the right of way has been going on for two years, temporary and permanent land acquisitions have been made, extensive buried resources investigations have been completed and final reports written and provided to the Chumash tribes and USBR, a letter of concurrence of no effect is expected from SHPO by the end of January, which is the final requirement for Reclamation to issue the Section 106 permit,

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tribal monitoring during construction has been arranged, the south portal has undergone review and has been determined not to be a cultural resource, USBR construction permits are completed and awaiting issuance of the Record of Decision for the EIS, Section 7 consultation has been completed for steelhead and red-legged frogs, all permits will finally be in hand by mid-February, the construction engineering management contract has been awarded, construction of the project has been bid twice, and COMB has received an excellent bid that the contractor has extended three times waiting for the Section 106 cultural resources evaluations to be completed, COMB has a Prop 50 grant for \$3.2M, all Member Units have approved the COMB bond, and COMB has spent approximately \$1M to date on the project for all of these activities, exclusive of staff time.

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RESOLUTION NO. 496

A RESOLUTION OF THE CACHUMA OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE BOARD ESTABLISHING POLICY REGARDING THE SOUTH COAST CONDUIT IN REGARD TO CAPITAL PROJECT PRIORITIES, COST SHARING FOR DELIVERIES TO NON-MEMBERS, AND APPORTIONING PEAK DELIVERY CAPACITY

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Cachuma Operation and Maintenance Board ("COMB") operates and maintains the Cachuma Project South Coast Conduit (SCC) delivery system to convey water from Lake Cachuma to the distribution systems of Goleta Water District, City of Santa Barbara, Carpinteria Valley Water District, and Montecito Water District, together the "SCMUs;" and

WHEREAS, the SCC also conveys State Water Project water from Lake Cachuma on behalf of certain entities that are not members of COMB; which agencies pay a Warren Act charge to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation for such deliveries, but do not contribute toward the expenses incurred by COMB in the operation, maintenance, and capital improvement of the SCC facilities; and

WHEREAS, budget assessments to ("SCMU") for costs associated with COMB's expenses are based on the following percentages ("Cost Allocation Percentages"), which represent each SCMU's respective share of total South Coast entitlement to Cachuma Project water:

Goleta Water District		40.42%
City of Santa Barbara		35.88%
Carpinteria Valley Water District		12.20%
Montecito Water District		11.50%

; and

WHEREAS, various existing pipeline and related infrastructre constraints may limit the ability of the SCC to meet water demands for the SCMUs during peak demand periods generally occurring with hot summer weather,

WHEREAS, SCC water deliveries to date have not resulted in shortages to SCMUs under normal infrastructure operating conditions; and

WHEREAS, COMB has conducted engineering studies to identify capital improvements needed to the SCC, which studies have resulted in a list of recommended projects expected to increase reliability and re-establish the design capacity of the upper and lower reaches of the SCC; and

WHEREAS, COMB has expended significant effort to secure a revenue bond to fund

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certain SCMUs' share of the cost of the priority projects; has secured \$3.2 million in Proposition 50 grant funding for the largest project, known as the SCC Upper Reach Reliability Project ("Second Pipeline Project"); has received bids for the project and is in the process of reviewing such bids; and

WHEREAS, COMB is contractually obligated to provide matching funds of approximately \$5 million and to construct the Second Pipeline Project per the terms of its agreement with the Santa Barbara County Water Agency ("County Water Agency") and the County Water Agency's Proposition 50 Master Agreement with the State of California: and

WHEREAS, the schedules for completion of the Second Pipeline Project under Proposition 50 contractual requirements, bid acceptance on the Second Barrel Pipeline, and issuance of the bond are extremely constrained; and

WHEREAS, the bond issuance requires unanimous approval by the COMB Board of Directors, and all five COMB Member Units must separately approve the bond by a majority vote; and

WHEREAS, Carpinteria Valley Water District ("CVWD") has declined to approve the proposed bond issue, citing concerns about ensuring equitable benefit to all COMB members from the capital improvement projects to be funded by the bond, but has agreed to reconsider its position on bond approval in October 2009; and

WHEREAS, a Special Joint Meeting of COMB and CVWD was held on September 21, 2009 to report on discussions among the Member Unit management staff to consider and respond to CVWD's concerns; and

WHEREAS, at the Special Joint Meeting there was general consensus on the importance of completing the priority projects and facilitating completion of the bond issuance; and,

WHEREAS, three potential policy actions were proposed for consideration by COMB at its September 28, 2009 meeting to address equity issues raised by CVWD related to pipeline capacity and reliable delivery of water during peak demand periods.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. The following list of projects and estimated project costs will constitute the priority for COMB's Capital Improvement Program under the proposed bond funding or such other financing as is available to COMB:

- 2. COMB acknowledges that non-COMB members that receive deliveries of water through the SCC facilities should contribute a share of the expenses incurred by COMB for the operation, maintenance, and capital improvement of the SCC facilities, and COMB commits to pursuing an equitable cost sharing arrangement with such recipients.
- 3. COMB has a duty and responsibility to diligently monitor water deliveries to all Member Units. COMB affirms the principle that each SCMU is entitled to a percentage share of both peak and average deliveries through the SCC equal to its respective Cost Allocation Percentage and that no Member Unit shall take deliveries from the SCC at a rate that has an impact on another Member Unit receiving its share of water deliveries unless a mutually agreed arrangement has been reached by member units regarding this issue. Any such arrangement for charges for overuse will be established by mutual agreement of the SC member units.
- 4. This Resolution No. 496 shall take effect immediately.

Please be advised that the Board of Directors of Carpinteria Valley Water District, at its regularly scheduled Board meeting held on January 12, 2011, considered your (attached) letter dated December 20, 2010, and authorized this letter in response.

Nothing of substance has charged with regard to the reasons for the decision made by this District on November 4, 2009 to decline participation in the funding of the South Coast Conduit Upper Reach Reliability Project, commonly known as the "Second Barrel" project, as set forth in the District's attached letter dated November 12, 2009.

Please be advised that the District continues to reject as inappropriate and inequitable the Cachuma entitlement based cost sharing formula proposed by the Cachuma Operation and Maintenance Board to fund a new "Second Barrel" facility to be added on to the South Coast Conduit.

Also attached for your consideration are the following:

- A copy of the text of remarks prepared for and delivered to COMB by Charles Hamilton on January 26, 2009 entitled "Time for a Strategic Plan for the Cachuma Project?"
- A letter dated July 6, 2009 from Charles Hamilton to Kate Rees with an attached memo dated June 2, 2009 from Charles Hamilton to the District's Rate & Budget Committee about cost sharing.
- A memo dated September 15, 2009 from District Engineer Bob McDonald to General Manager Charles Hamilton, Re: Second Barrel Project Benefits Analysis;
- A memo dated October 29, 2009 from Charles Hamilton, General Manager, to the Carpinteria Valley Water District Board of Directors, Re: District participation in and funding of COMB CIP Projects – Options;

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5) A copy of the text of remarks by Charles Hamilton to Goleta Water District Board 11/10/09.

Please also be advised that a decision of this magnitude by this Board of Directors as suggested in your December 20, 2010 letter, reversing the one made over 14 months ago, would necessitate considerable staff work in support of such a reversal, if one could be justified, and considerable public involvement, taking up to several months, with no guarantee of success. It could certainly not be an action taken within the deadline of January 12, 2011 set forth in your December 20, 2010 letter.

A more realistic and fruitful approach by COMB might be to direct COMB's engineer to conduct a detailed, hydraulic cost /benefit analysis of the Second Barrel Project in concert with CVWD's District Engineer Bob McDonald and a third registered civil engineer from either the City of Santa Barbara or Goleta Water District. Presumably such an analysis could be completed and presented to COMB within a couple of months, and subsequently provide CVWD's Board of Directors with a factually substantiated cost sharing basis to consider, and then possibly incorporate some new expense for the COMB Second Barrel project into the District's FY 11-12 Rates and Budget public hearing process.

Perhaps most importantly for all of us, does COMB have a Board approved back—up plan, should the Second Barrel Project not go forward, to address failure of the South Coast Conduit in the south portal area? If Glen Hille's (AECOM) reported statement at a Goleta Water Board meeting in 2009 about the likely failure of the South Coast Conduit in the south portal area within five years is credible, COMB should already have in place a detailed, engineered cost-based plan of action for a "shovel ready" repair and/or rehabilitation project to address and rectify such a failure. Such a repair/rehabilitation plan as well as the actual project would fall clearly within the existing Cachuma entitlement based cost sharing approach. Please also see the attached copies of a series of e-mails beginning with an August 2, 2010 e-mail from Charles Hamilton to John McInnes followed by one dated December 30, 2009 to Kate Rees.

Carpinteria Valley Water District remains fully committed to the success of COMB and looks forward to fully participating in COMB in the future.

(Remarks presented at Board meeting on 1/12/11)

One word for me to describe my reaction to the letter from COMB: "exasperating!"

Nothing has changed in over 14 months as far as the cost sharing issue we raised. It's just not appropriate for a Project like the Second Barrel to be funded using a cost sharing formula designed for the whole Cachuma Project back in the 50's.

And how preposterous to think that Carpinteria's water board might choose to reverse itself within less than 25 days and not bring a decision to commit to payment of \$1.3 million or more without going to the community through our the rate and budget process!

Aside from these responses, it is however very important to inform COMB and our community that we are greatly concerned about the condition of the over 30 miles of Tecolote Tunnel and South Coast Conduit we rely on. I am certain, Director Lieberknecht, that you share this concern. Without a delivery system a water supply is useless, whether it be surface or groundwater. With the greatest exposure of all south coast agencies at end of the system, we in Carpinteria Valley are fully committed to COMB's addressing clearly identified weaknesses of the South Coast Conduit system ASAP.

If the Second Barrel Project was established as the best way to address imminent failure of 8,000 feet of South Coast Conduit in the Goleta area, we would be compelled to participate. But this has not been the case. It has been designed with other purposes in mind not related to problems caused by Carpinteria Valley WD.

So I have two suggestions for COMB:

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- take immediate steps to prepare and approve "shovel ready" plans of action for the most vulnerable problem areas of the South Coast Conduit in the event of a failure. This would ensure that interruptions to supply would be minimized, and allow the south coast agencies to begin building up earmarked funds for such an event; and
- 2) develop a comprehensive plan for a program and bond funding of repair, replacement and/or rehabilitation of the total Conduit system, to be put before the voters for approval. I can't imagine such a proposal for something we all depend on so critically meeting with the same fate as the recent County Jail proposal.

After many months of discussion regarding funding for the South Coast Conduit Upper Reach Reliability Project (2nd Pipeline Project), in November 2009 the Carpinteria Valley Water District (CVWD) declined to fund its share of the 2nd Pipeline Project. After much deliberation by the Santa Barbara City Council (City), Goleta Water District (GWD), and Montecito Water District (MWD) Boards, these three Member Units agreed to fund the total cost of the project themselves, acknowledging the inequity of CVWD's lack of participation, but recognizing the importance and necessity of constructing the 2nd Pipeline Project. MWD decided to pay its share in cash through a Contribution Agreement, and GWD and the City decided to fund their respective shares through a bond issuance by COMB. Subsequent to CVWD's action, all of the Cachuma Member Units approved the COMB bond, and COMB gave its unanimous approval on March 10, 2010.

The COMB JPA also requires a unanimous vote by COMB, and ratification by all Member Units, for any project expenditure over \$1 million, so second round of approvals is still needed before the project can move forward. Because CVWD will benefit from construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project, and to eliminate the inequity of the other South Coast Member Units paying for CVWD's share of the project, COMB requests that the District reconsider its earlier decision, and agree to participate in funding its entitlement share of the capital cost, as provided under the COMB Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) for any financial obligation over \$1 million. The total estimated cost of the project is \$10,450,000, with a not to exceed amount of \$11,000,000. CVWD's share of that cost would be \$1,274,900 and \$1,342,000 respectively.

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There are several funding options that the CVWD Board might consider. These include the following:

- 1. Participate in the 30 year COMB bond for 12.2% of the total project cost, not to exceed \$11M, with GWD and the City. COMB will carry the debt.
- Enter into a Contribution Agreement with COMB to pay 12.2% of the total project cost, not to exceed \$11M.
- 3. If acceptable to GWD, the City, and MWD, these three Member Units could from CVWD's share of the total project cost, and CVWD would enter into an agreement with COMB to repay its 12.2%, plus interest, over 30 years. CVWD's payments would be returned proportionately to GWD, the City, and MWD.

As you are aware, COMB has received an excellent bid for construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project, and the contractor, Blois Construction, Inc. has agreed to extend the bid while awaiting all permitting to be completed. We should have all regulatory permits in hand by late January 2011. Final approvals for the project expenditure need to occur very shortly thereafter so that the funding process can be completed. Therefore, time is of the essence. COMB will need an official response from your District by January 12, 2011 or we will assume that CVWD does not wish to participate in the 2nd Pipeline project. It is, of course, our hope to receive an affirmative response to this letter by the stated deadline.

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Operations Report – December 2010

The average flow from Lake Cachuma into the Tecolote Tunnel for December was 60 acrefeet per day. Lake elevation was 735.31 feet at the beginning of the month and 742.96 feet at the end. 50 acre-feet of State Water Project water was wheeled through Cachuma Project facilities and delivered to South Coast Member Units during the month.

The Ortega Reservoir was systematically drained and taken off-line on December 30, 2010. The Bureau has requested that COMB continue to monitor drain flow, piezometer elevations and site conditions for comparative information.

Other activities conducted this month include:

- COMB continues to receive Land Use Authorization requests and is utilizing approved procedures to process incoming encroachment applications. A quarterly spreadsheet report detailing land use activity is attached.
- The Lauro Dam Tabletop Exercise has been re-scheduled for Wednesday, February 2 2011 at the City of Santa Barbara Emergency Operations Center. A complete Emergency Action Plan and Incident Command Structure for COMB have been developed. The scenario will be an earthquake, involving all levels of emergency response within Santa Barbara County.
- Progress continued on the 2nd Pipeline. A complete status of the project is included in the board packet.
- The Operations Crew has completed the recommended items from the USBR Periodic Facility Review that could be accommodated within the current budget.
- A revision of the Standing Operating Procedures for COMB facilities is in process and should be completed by the end of January.
- Staff continues to review SCC Reliability Studies prepared by AECOM and maintenance logs in an effort to update the Long Term Capital Improvement Program.
- Summers Engineering is finalizing the data collection and analysis phase of the 2010 Watershed Sanitary Survey Update. A draft report will be available in March 2011.
- A Maintenance Program for Operations is being developed by staff. A Beta version is currently being tested. The program is fully automated, integrating existing mobile mapping technology and hardware (currently in use) with customized maintenance input forms optimized for field use. The standard Adobe software provides reporting features and real-time maintenance updates for the Operations Supervisor. A demonstration of the Maintenance Program will be presented at the January board meeting.
- Opened Glen Annie Dam drain to lower reservoir elevation and continue to monitor inflows
- Removed large four foot diameter tree that fell across Glen Annie turnout road

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- Supplemented Lauro debris basin pump with two three inch temporary trash pumps to help lower the water level in basin during peak rain events
- Investigating costs to replace twelve inch valve at the Barker Pass pump station, as the station is currently off line for upgrades

Routine operation and maintenance activities conducted during the month included:

- Sampled water at the North Portal Intake Tower
- Monitored conduit right-of-way and responded to Dig Alert reports
- Read piezometers and underdrains at Glen Anne, Lauro, Ortega and Carpinteria Dams
- Read meters, conducted monthly dam inspections, and flushed venturi meters
- Inspected access roads during rain events

In compliance with the Cachuma Project Biological Opinion (BO) and as described in the Lower Santa Ynez River Fish Management Plan (FMP) and the Monitoring Program in the revised Biological Assessment (BA), the Cachuma Project Biology Staff (CPBS) conducts routine monitoring of steelhead/rainbow trout and their habitat on the Lower Santa Ynez River (LSYR) below Bradbury Dam. The following is a list of activities carried out by CPBS during the month of December 2010 that has been broken out by categories.

Migrant Trapping:

All migrant traps were refurbished and prepared for deployment. The traps on Hilton Creek, Salsipuedes Creek and the LSYR mainstem were deployed 1/6/11 and have been continually operating to date.

Lake Cachuma Water Quality Profiles:

CPBS did not conduct their monthly water quality profile (temp and DO) at the intake barge for the Hilton Creek Watering System within Lake Cachuma in December due to bad weather. The final profile for the season will be taken in January as weather permits. This monitoring effort is normally done from May through December to track water quality and lake stratification to depth before, during and after the dry season.

Beaver Dam Mapping:

CPBS began their mapping of all beaver dams in the LSYR drainage. This will be wrapped up in January. An inventory of beaver dam locations is done every year prior to the migration season (January-May) to evaluate steelhead passage conditions as well as to track beaver population trends within the LSYR mainstem and its tributaries.

Reporting:

CPBS worked with Reclamation on incorporating their comments on the BO Compliance Binder which will be finalized and sent to NMFS in January. CPBS provided documentation to Reclamation, NMFS, CDFG and USFWS regarding the temporary wooden weir plate installed by CDFG on the Jalama Road fish ladder to enable evaluation for the requested removal of the plate. A determinate on this matter will be issued in January.

Outreach and Training:

The Senior Resources Scientist met with one landowner and called two others to discuss Quiota Creek fish passage issues. He also gave a tour to Mary Larson (CDFG) and Milena Viljoen (NMFS) of the Jalama Road, Cross Creek Ranch and Rancho San Julian fish passage projects. All projects were in good working order with both agency representatives pleased with what they saw. CPBS attended the 12/16/10 Tri-County Fish Team Forum that was reported during the 12/20/10 CCRB Board meeting.

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Consultant Activity Summary (December):

Northwest Hydraulic Consultants (Ed Wallace) – Hilton Creek Channel Enhancement Study: CPBS provided comments on the draft report and NHC worked on comment incorporation. The report is expected in January.

Cardino-ENTRIX (Jean Baldrige) – BO Compliance Binder preparation, worked with CPBS to incorporate all of Reclamation's comments on the Binder.

Melinda Fournier Tree Specialist (Melinda Fournier) – Cachuma Lake Oak Tree Restoration Program: monthly field maintenance and nursery operations.

Best, Best and Krieger (Greg Wilkinson) - BO Compliance coordination.

HDR Fisheries Design Center (Mike Garello) – Design work for Quiota Creek Crossings in preparation for project permitting, regulatory review and grant proposals. They also provided technical support for the performance evaluation of the Quiota Creek Crossing 6 and El Jaro Creek Rancho San Julian fish passage projects.

Prop 50 Proponents,

There have been several recent developments in regard to the Grant so that a status update is now warranted. As you know, reimbursement from the SWRCB has been periodically suspended in response to the billing irregularities that occurred with the Casmalia project. Currently, reimbursement is up to date as we prepare to submit invoice #9. The SWRCB is undergoing several staff changes including the replacement of Barbara Evoy, the Deputy Director of the Division of Financial Assistance and Scott Couch, the program manager, is leaving in early December.

The Department of Finance (DOF) audit has been completed although the SWRCB has yet to receive an official report. However, the SWRCB has used the audit to formulate new suggestion/requirements for our group (see attached SWRCB letter). I continue to request information regarding the conclusions of the audit but have received none.

As you may recall, the SWRCB agreed to consider a revised Casmalia project. The County has submitted to the SWRCB a revised proposal with a viable project and solid oversight in order to prevent additional billing irregularities. The SWRCB has responded to the proposal by asking that we remove the Casmalia project from the Grant. The County will decline to remove the project at this time.

Nearly eight months ago, we submitted the necessary information for the SWRCB to process funding, scope, and timeline changes to nine of the projects included in the Grant and a one year extension to the Grant period. This should result in a new agreement between the SWRCB and the County and modified sub agreements between the County and Proponents. The State appears to be working toward preparation of a new agreement.

The attached letter also requests that we move from a quarterly to a monthly billing cycle. We will decline this course of action because it would result in significantly more work and expense for both the proponents and the County, and would do little toward its stated purpose of increasing cash flow to DACs and preventing future billing irregularities.

In summary, the County will decline some of the SWRCB requests stated in the attached letter because we consider them to be unreasonably burdensome and ineffectual toward their stated purpose. In addition, we as a group have complied with extensive corrective actions and now believe that the risk of additional invoicing irregularities is insignificant. Therefore, we will work toward a new contract in accordance with these considerations. Although the SWRCB has phrased their suggestions as requests, it is possible that they will again withhold either reimbursement or execution of the new contract pending our agreement. We will work to address this if it occurs.

Financial Status:

Attached is a spread sheet showing the current financial status. We continue to receive reimbursement from the State for administrative costs which we then put toward the Kennedy Jenks contract. About \$42,000 remains on the KJ contract which they estimate will last another year. Total funds spent thus far on Invoicing Administration, General Administration, and County Management is \$168,702, \$56,901 and \$68,191, respectively. The funds collected from your agencies (\$360,993) combined with reimbursement from the State (\$144,337) minus the expenses results in a balance of over \$200,000. This is expected to last for a significant period of time.

Hi all interested IRWM parties,

Happy New Year! Hope everyone is looking forward to a prosperous 2011! The Santa Barbara IRWM region was busy in late hours of 2010 and got off to a good start in 2011. Here are some items we would like to update you all on:

This past Monday (January 10), the Round 1 Prop 84 Implementation Grant Application containing 7 projects region wide for a total grant request of \$3 million was submitted to DWR. The link to the Santa Barbara region's application will be posted on the County's IRWM website: http://www.countyofsb.org/pwd/pwwater.aspx?id=16852 and we encourage you all to take a look at this stellar (and colossally large) document. The list of projects included in the application is attached. We want to thank **everyone** who worked on this application, including the consultants and all the agencies who have projects as well as our Cooperating Partners, Steering Committee, Stakeholders and all the public who came out for the workshops, helped us to build the project list and provided input. This was an incredible work effort.

This month DWR will release the **final** Planning Grant list of awards. Our Planning Grant Application was submitted in September, 2010 and the draft funding recommendations were posted by DWR on Dec. 8, 2010. DWR recommended funding our full grant request for \$555,737. This would allow us to update our existing plan to current standards and would also fund two focus studies: 1) a Groundwater Basin Assessment in support of Salt and Nutrient Management Planning; and 2) a Santa Barbara County/South Coast Sub-Region Recycled Water Development Plan. The planning grant application is available for viewing at:

Pursuant to the update to the existing IRWM Plan (2007), we will be holding outreach and informational workshops in the coming months. We hope to see many, if not all of you at the workshops. Your participation is critical to resolving the current water challenges our State, and indeed the Santa Barbara region faces. We hope you will become involved and share ideas that will help guide our region to the most sound water management solutions ensuring sustainable water uses, reliable water supplies, better water quality, environmental stewardship, efficient urban development, and the protection of agriculture.

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Proposition 84 Implementation Grant Working Project List Developed by the SB Region Cooperating Partners

The project list below is the result of a 10 month project selection process involving 25 agencies & various NGO stakeholder groups. The project development & selection process was a guided by a consultant group using a multi-objective ranking process. Projects were nominated by project proponents from a long list of the region's potential future projects. The projects are intended to address regional water planning priorities in the SB IRWM Region. Projects on the list were vetted for feasibility, available funding (as match), timing, complement with the State IRWM priorities & regional distribution & equity.

City of Santa Maria's Secondary Water Efficiency System – Extends an existing groundwater landscape irrigation system from the City's Civic Center area to facilities with landscaped area, including Allen Hancock College, Miller Elementary school, Santa Maria High school, Santa Maria Fairpark & Adam Basin. The project allows for water use efficiency while enhancing water management efforts through delivery systems that utilize an abundant groundwater resource from the Santa Maria groundwater basin. The irrigation system consists of several old production water wells that were removed from domestic supply due to high nitrate concentrations. The wells will be rehabilitated & put into service to water turf & other landscapes through a piping system that is isolated from the domestic supply piping. The efficient match of water resources to water use augments drought preparedness efforts within the region. Further, water reliability is strengthened by decreasing the burden on State Water Project water.

<u>City of Santa Maria's LeakWatch</u> – Allows the City to complete the installation of a water meter system which reads water use data in real time. With the LeakWatch system, real-time data is broken down to show usage by hour, which could indicate a water leak or over use if there is 24-hour activity. The system includes base stations, converted water meter registers, transmitters & associated software. Data provided by the fixed-base system is used to detect leaks & assist customers in making better decisions regarding water usage. The project estimates 250 AFY of conservation in the domestic water supply. The project will also assist with water shortage contingency planning by allowing the City to track hourly water use to assure that customers are abiding by restrictions on water use or schedules.

City of Guadalupe's Recycled Water Feasibility Study – The study will include a market assessment & identification of required recycled water distribution facilities as well as a cost/benefit analysis to evaluate the feasibility of supplying recycled water to the City of Guadalupe & surrounding property owners, all of whom are dependent on groundwater. The market assessment will identify potential recycled water customers, both within & adjacent to the City's boundaries & match recycled supply to potential demand. Potential customers include existing sports parks, community parks, schools, cemeteries, produce packing plants & agricultural areas. Delivery of recycled water to agricultural customers outside the service area will be evaluated differently due to the impact on overall revenues. Once reuse categories are prioritized & sets of potential customers are identified, distribution system alternatives will be explored to maximize recycled water use with the lowest capital O&M costs. The economic of recycled water distribution systems are such that larger demand will dictate the alignments of backbone pipeline routes. After alternative alignments are identified for up to three different customer sets, the required pipelines pump stations & storage reservoirs can be sited. The study will also discuss the feasibility, limitations & potential water quality impacts or groundwater recharge & compare the potential benefits with the delivery of recycled water to existing potable water customers.

Lompoc Valley Regional Leak Detection Program – The project is collaboration between the City of Lompoc, the Mission Hills CSD & the Vandenberg Village CSD to complete a leak detection audit of the water distribution systems of the 3 utilities & develop & implement a 5-year plan for the repair and/or replacement of leaky water services & mains. Leak detection reports will be reviewed to determine which sections of distribution systems show the highest percentage of system leaks. A plan will be prepared for leak repair, targeting the areas with the highest percentage of leaks for sequencing of repairs.

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Proposition 84 Implementation Grant Project List (Continued) Developed by the SB Region Cooperating Partners

Central Coast Water Authority's Pipeline Erosion Damage Repair Project – The CCWA owns & operates a pipeline that delivers water from the Santa Ynez Pumping Plant located in the Santa Ynez Valley to Lake Cachuma. There are 2 locations along the pipeline where there is exposure due to erosion of overlying soils caused by high flow releases from Bradbury Dam or high flow storm events & associated flow of water over the pipeline's alignment. These types of pipeline exposures place the pipeline at risk for failure because the exposed pipe has lost the structural confinement of backfill, an important strengthening component of the pipeline & because the exposed pipeline will bridge & obstruct water flow, which will subject the pipeline to strong external forces arising from the impact of high flow water. The project will implement both interim & long term fixes to protect the sections of the exposed pipe from further damage. The pipeline was originally constructed in the 1960's for the purposes of delivering water from Lake Cachuma to the Santa Ynez Valley. CCWA acquired the pipeline in the mid-1990's to complete its water conveyance system for its southern Santa Barbara County participants. The pipeline is comprised of a nominal 30" diameter pipe, 12 miles long & is either cement mortar line/coal tar enamel coated steel pipe or modified pre-stressed concrete cylinder pipe. The Santa Ynez Pumping Plant will discharge water into the pipeline at flow rates as high as 10,000 gpm, with a shutoff head of 376'.

Goleta Sanitary District's Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade – Upgrading the existing wastewater treatment facilities in order to be able to treat 100% of the wastewater from Goleta Valley to a full secondary treatment level. The current facilities have a design flow of 9 MGD & can treat 100% of flow to the primary level, but only 4.38 MGD can be treated to the secondary standards. The project will need to increase the capacity of the secondary treatment structures without increasing the overall capacity of the treatment plant. Construction will include a new biofilter, an aeration basin, two new secondary sedimentation tanks & the conversion of an existing stabilization basin into a flow equalization basin.

<u>City of Goleta's San Jose Creek Capacity Improvement & Fish Passage Project</u> – Removal & reconstruction of the San Jose Creek Flood Control Channel. When completed in conjunction with a separate project (not requesting funding through Prop 84) for reconstruction of the Hollister Ave. bridge over San Jose creek, the total benefits include increased flood conveyance capacity, reduced flood hazard & provision of fish passage for migrating endangered steelhead trout. The project will remove over 200 residential, commercial & industrial properties from the regulatory floodplain. The new channel will include an articulated concrete bottom allowing fish passage during low flow events, reduce adverse water quality impacts to Goleta Slough & increase groundwater recharge.

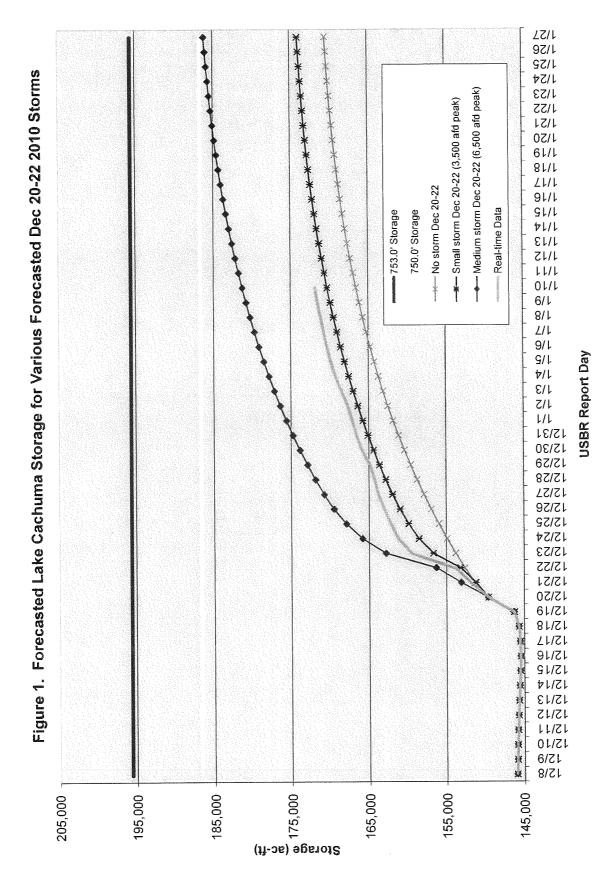
